

Frisco Highline Trail

Services Guide — South to North

Springfield Trailhead—MILE MARKER 0—On Kearney Street, two blocks west of West Bypass/Highway 160

Parking: Yes

Restroom: No

Water: No

Food: Nearest is Courtyard Marriott Café 1/4-mile east of trailhead on Kearney, Fast food is about 1/2-mile east

Lodging: Closest is Courtyard Marriott Hotel and La Quinta Hotel, both 1/4-mile east of trailhead on Kearney Street

Other: Downtown Springfield is about 5 miles southeast of this trailhead and has numerous services and lodging options. A signed on-street bike route network connects the trailhead into town—head east on Kearney Street to Fullbright Avenue and follow the signs. There is also a city bus stop at this trailhead, and the bus can carry two bikes on its front rack and more inside as space allows.

Willard Trailhead—MILE MARKER 6—On Jackson Street (Main Street), just south of Highway O

Parking: Yes

Restroom/Water: Across the street at the Willard City Pool, open 9am-10pm spring to fall and weather dependent in winter, Convenience stores are located at mile marker 5.5 and between mile markers 8-9 at the junction of highways 160 and 123

Food: A variety of fast food restaurants nearby, a few unique local restaurants, At mile marker 5.5, there is a McDonald's and a convenience store, There's a local diner between mile marker 8-9 at the junctions of highways 160 and 123

Lodging: No

Walnut Grove Trailhead—MILE MARKER 16—On Highway BB, about a mile east of Highway 123

Parking: Yes

Restroom: No

Water: No

Food: A mile west of this trailhead at the junction of highways BB and 123, is Walnut Grove's main street, There is a gas station/convenience store on the southeast corner that has a small amount of groceries

Lodging: No

Other: 7 C's Winery is about a mile west of the trail at 502 E. 560th Rd. / www.7cswinery.com / (417)788-2263, The TransAmerica Bicycle Trail is a national east/west cross-country on-road biking route that crosses the trail on Highway BB at this point! Created in 1976, it connects Astoria, Oregon, to Yorktown, Virginia—about 4,250 miles. Don't be surprised if you hear cyclists speaking a variety of languages as they pass by. Wishart Trailhead—MILE MARKER 24—On County Road 514, northwest of Morrisville

Parking: Yes

Restroom: Yes, port-a-potty at trailhead

Water: No

Food: No

Lodging: No

Other: At mile marker 25, the "Highline Bridge" is the longest on the trail at 317 feet long

Bolivar Trailhead—MILE MARKER 35+—On Highway 32/Broadway, about a mile east of Highway 13

Parking: Yes

Restroom: Yes, at trailhead, open 8am-3pm, weather dependent in winter

Water: Yes, drinking fountain at trailhead

Food: Downtown Bolivar is about 1/3-mile east of the trailhead on Highway 32/Broadway, There are a variety of local and franchise restaurants nearby, Ask a local for a recommendation

Lodging: Nearest is Bolivar Super 8 (417)777-8888

Other: There's a covered pavilion with picnic tables at this trailhead. South of Bolivar, at mile marker 32, the trail cuts through the middle of La Petite Gemme Prairie, a uniquely pristine native Ozarks prairie managed by the Missouri Prairie Foundation and the Missouri Department of Conservation.
